# American Red Cross

- 1900 American Red Cross established by U.S. Congressional mandate
  - Aid to wounded
  - Communication between military and family members
  - Relief to those affected by disasters




# American Red Cross Disaster Mental Health Services

- 1990 recognized need for psychological support following two large disasters
  - Earthquake and hurricane
- Volunteer licensed mental health professionals (currently)
  - 40% social workers
  - 22% psychologists
  - 18% mental health counselors
  - 14% psychiatric nurses
  - 5% marriage & family counselors
  - 1% psychiatrists



- Cover 5 boroughs NYC & 4 Upstate counties (population approximately 9 million)
- Respond to 9 disasters daily
- Over 3,000 yearly
- 1995 New York Chapter developed volunteer mental health program
- Mental Health coverage available 24/7
- 2001 1st Paid Mental Health Director



### Disaster Mental Health Notification Guidelines



- Death or missing person / Death or missing pet
- Multiple casualties
- Child who appears fearful or traumatized
- Person who is highly agitated, depressed, confused, very angry, extremely anxious
- Request by client, family member, staff member or community to speak with a mental health worker
- Request for chaplain
- Individual or community with history of major trauma & disaster
- Special needs population (children, elderly, physically or mentally disabled)
- Staff member in distress (fatigued, agitated, or overwhelmed)
- Whenever a Red Cross reception center, service center or shelter is opened

## Disaster Mental Health Interventions

#### Psychological First Aid

- Emotional support
- Linking to basic needs
- Validating thoughts & feelings
- Supporting concrete tasks
- Providing access to information
- Connecting to support systems
- Normalizing stress reactions
- Reinforcing Positive Coping Strategies

#### Crisis Intervention

- Assessment
- Problem solving
- Psycho education
- Referral

#### Other

- Advocacy
- Bereavement Counseling
- Anger Management
- Supporting Death Notification
- Support to Paid and Volunteer Staff


